## **A Message from the President and Executive Director**

A spirit of philanthropy is essential to the well-being of any community.

In 2005-06, we made great strides towards further fulfilling our philanthropic leadership role in the community.

This year’s Highlights include:

- Earnings: \$71,878
- Return on Investment: 11.4%
- New Funds Established: 7
- Total Number of Funds: 33
- Grants & Disbursements: \$102,230
- Total Assets: \$812,408
- Asset Growth: 31% from \$621,578

Successful Community Partnerships:

- Provided the focal point for the Physician Recruitment Fundraising Program. The annual goal is \$200,000.
- Helped with the Cedar Ridge Classical Pops concert in managing the cash flows, grants distribution, accounting, reporting, endowment asset allocation as well as administration. The 2006 event fundraising theme focused on Health Care in rural Ontario.

\$130,000 has been raised for the following three important areas: for support of the local Physician Recruitment Program; for establishing the first Huronia Endowment Fund for Health Care; and for support of the local Hospital Foundation Capital Campaign.

- Helped create the Barrie Community Foundation. The two independent Foundations are establishing an administration “hub” to pool expertise and share expenses.

As a community foundation we have a unique philanthropic role to play. As we anticipate future needs, our commitment to the community is to use the resources entrusted to us in the most effective way possible.

By encouraging philanthropy that will create permanent endowed investments, we will be able to offer long term support to the many charities we are already working with in the community. It is our role to facilitate grant giving and to increase awareness of the many ways a person can give back to the community.

A sincere ‘thank you’ to the Allied Professionals for their support in helping us increase philanthropy in Huronia.

We also thank all our donors, volunteers and community partners for their vision, passion and inspiration.

An important development for the Grants Committee has been to introduce

a consistent evaluation system for all grant applications received and to move to a quarterly review process. We thank Dr. Pam Chart for her leadership in this area.

Our exposure within the community continues to be supported by the Free Press and the Midland Mirror. We have experienced an increase in the number of Grant applications received and believe that this directly related to the exposure from these two local newspapers. We want to thank them for helping us spread our message throughout the community.

I look forward to the continued participation of the Grants Committee and thank the Foundation Board and the Fund Donors for their support. Through their efforts, my Committee has the pleasure of and ability to make a difference throughout the Huronia area.

### Making an Impact

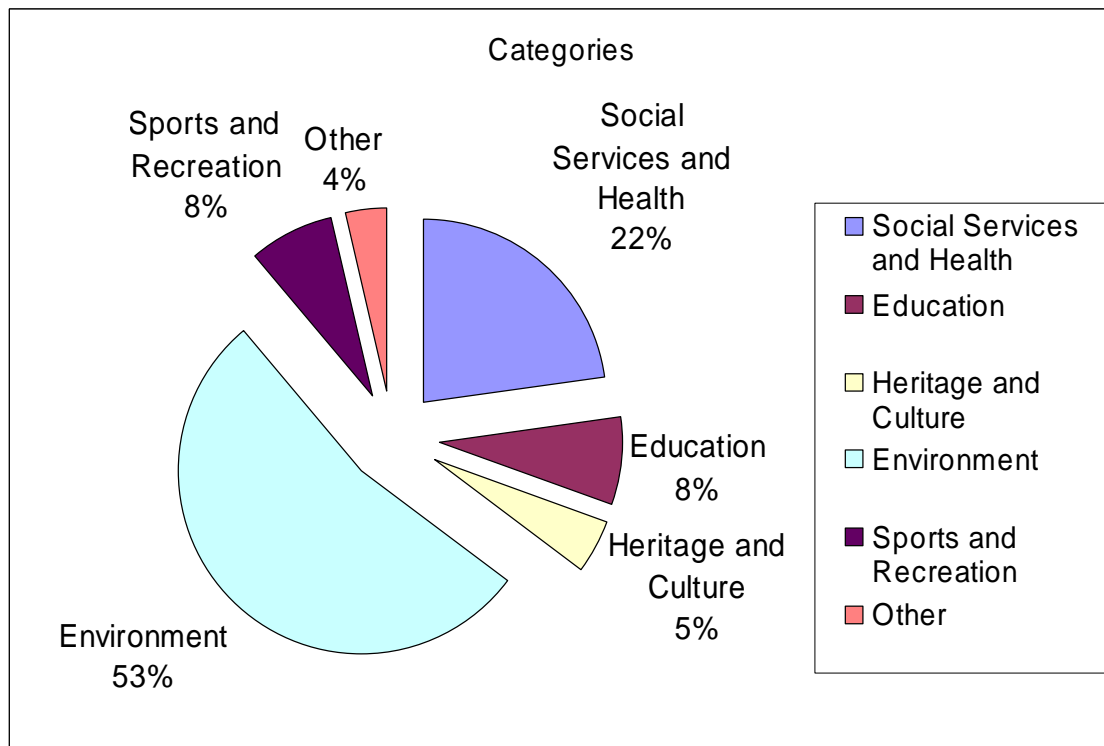
We awarded Grants totalling \$102,230 from April 1, 2005 to March 31, 2006. Of that, \$20,619 is from the earnings of the Foundation. The remainder \$81,611 is from Corporate Giving Programs that we manage (LabX, Daysco), and for collaborative Grants for a Healthy Streams Project that we secured from Trillium for the Severn Sound Environmental Association.

### Wye Marsh



This money will be used to purchase much needed medical equipment and medication as well as vet bills and equipment for the swan program.

### Womens Resources of Simcoe County



The Foundation's grant of \$1,000 helped send 12 women and 30 children to an Adventure Empowerment Camp this summer.

### MS Society



The money was used to purchase a wheelchair and assist with household help and childcare for families with MS in need.

### YAC Youth Grant



This grant is to Caps 4 Kids, an organization that make surgical hats for children of Huronia facing serious surgery and cancer treatments.

### Midland Library



This grant will buy subscriptions to enlarge the high technology section of the library. Some funds will be used to sponsor a reading series over several nights in the library where various authors will have the opportunity to present their work.

### Community Living Huronia



This grant from the Gignac Fund will support two individuals to attend Camp Prospect for one week each.

### Wendat



This grant is to Wendat's health care programs that provide community support and rehabilitation services..

### OSPCA



The grant money will be used to purchase a much needed laptop computer to provide educational presentations on SPCA and Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre to local community groups and schools.

### Quest Gallery & School

# Volunteers Making a Difference

## Joyce Roberts



Joyce Roberts is a people person who has spent many years working with young people as Guidance Counsellor and Head of Guidance at Midland

Secondary School. Joyce continues her investment in youth with her wonderful work with the Youth Advisory Council (YAC) of the Huronia Communities Foundation.

Her enthusiasm for working with students and her incredible knowledge of the school system made her an ideal candidate to take on the Adult Coordinator role of the YAC.

“This community has been good to me and there is appeal in giving back”, she says.

Joyce noted that many things go on in a community that are unseen yet make a huge difference in the lives of people. Huronia is made up of many smaller communities that would slip through the cracks if not for the work of the Foundation. HCF has made Huronia a better place and as Joyce mentioned, the vehicle for giving is a timely and efficient one without red tape.

A number of other organizations have benefited from Joyce’s volunteer efforts. She was a major contributor to the Len Self Youth Challenge and was involved for several years on the Coach of the Year project.

Joyce also volunteers with the Rotary Club’s PROBUS where she is Chair of

the Social and Outing Committee, coordinating unique events for members. As well, she sits on the Service Request Committee for Community Living Huronia reviewing submissions to the Committee.

When it comes to volunteering and philanthropy, Joyce has great advice. “If you feel you have a talent that you want to explore, volunteering is a great opportunity to try it out. It’s not a fit for everyone and making sure that you choose those areas that are a good match for you will ensure that your efforts and investments work well for you and for the organization.”

Joyce remarked that volunteer work and building relationships with people enriches her life. It gives her a chance to meet people going in different directions and to be involved with an organization where she is making a meaningful contribution.

## Jacquie Skinner



In 2004, Jacquie was invited to volunteer with the Huronia Communities Foundation (HCF). That volunteer work blossomed into an instrumental

role as Chair of the Grants Committee, a flexible and creative group that, following a review process, awards Grants to local projects.

Besides bringing a wealth of financial knowledge and expertise to HCF, Jacquie appreciates its support of numerous local causes. HCF enabled her to give back to the community, interacting with other like-minded individuals, while constantly learning new things.

Jacque noted that many people think of philanthropy as the giving of large amounts of money, but in fact, she says, “Even limited amounts of time and money can have an amazing impact – small donations represent philanthropy too.” She mentioned that local media have helped raise awareness of HCF activities, which in turn, may increase philanthropy in our area.

Also volunteering with the North Simcoe Community Futures Development Corporation, Jacque enjoys seeing businesses succeed and thrive as a result of support and funding.

By volunteering her time and knowledge, Jacque gains personal satisfaction and experience outside the realm of her daily focus and sees the impact that her effort and energy have on making projects thrive.

The Youth Advisory Council is the “youth” component of the Huronia Communities Foundation. It functions to grant funds to organizations that best meet the needs of youth in Huronia.

YAC has representation from the schools of Huronia and meets once a month to determine possible recipients.

During the 2005-2006 year, YAC sponsored two single-parent families at Christmas as part of the Children’s Aid Holiday Sponsorship Program for \$550.00. They also made a grant of \$800.00 to Caps 4 Kids, an organization that makes surgical hats for children of Huronia facing serious surgery and cancer treatments. A second grant of \$400.00 was made to the Youth Centre to promote programs at the North Simcoe Sports and Recreation Centre.

### **Youth in Philanthropy**

This youth initiative is a way to create philanthropists, foster good citizenship and to inspire young people to care and to give back to their communities. YAC hopes to instill qualities that enable youth to cultivate the joy of giving and recognize the resulting benefits.

### Lynda Zuidema Endowment Fund



Lynda Zuidema and her family were long-time members of the Midland Bay Sailing Club and were instrumental in the formation of the

Club in the mid-60s.

Lynda followed in her father's footsteps as the Secretary-Treasurer and was the central figure in the administration of the Club for many years. From her teen years, when she sailed a Snipe and was recognized across Canada for her sailing prowess, until her untimely death at age 60, sailboat racing was her passion. Lynda sailed with many who were well known in racing circles both locally and internationally and, when not skipping the boat herself, was the key to many successes on the race course.

Her interest in sports extended to curling and golf, which kept her active throughout the calendar year.

This Fund has been established as a memorial to her and to give her many friends an opportunity to perpetuate her memory.

### “Ticker” (Christopher) Stow Endowment Fund



The Ticker Stow Endowment Fund is a perfect example of the way an individual can continue contributing to his favourite charities

after his passing.

Born and raised in England, Ticker flew with the Royal Air Force as a bomber pilot completing his 30th ops flight. He

investigated crashes and provided night flight training to ‘young hopefuls’.

In the late 1940's, he settled in Canada, married and finally retired in Penetanguishene. Ticker joined the local Alzheimer's Association, attending regular meetings and acting as an advisor for the Association. His other favoured charities included the Salvation Army, Red Cross, Penetanguishene Public Library and Severn Sound Environmental Association. All will benefit from Ticker's annual donations.

Ticker's Endowment Fund is yet another example of the way families can remember and acknowledge a loved one. Individuals may also make arrangements to create a living Endowment Fund.

Foundation pools its investments with the Toronto Community Foundation providing economies of scale for less administration costs and access to investment expertise on a national scale. Our Return on Investment (ROI) for Endowment Funds are for fiscal year ended March 31: 2006 = 11.4%; 2005 = 10.2%; 2004 = 20.7% and 2003 = -2.4%

HCF provides an opportunity for donors to ensure support of their favourite charity in perpetuity or to use the expertise of the Foundation to identify areas of greatest need. In the short term HCF's goal is to grow its Endowment Funds to enable a minimum of \$100,000 awarded annually in Grants for the betterment of the community.

## Charitable Investors Win Big

In its 2006 budget, the federal government announced it would eliminate capital gains tax on gifts of listed stocks to registered charities.

Donations of appreciated stock directly to the Huronia Communities Foundation will receive a tax receipt for the fully appreciated value of the donation and capital gains tax will not apply.
