Message from the President & Executive Director

It's hard to believe that our first decade is behind us. Time sure has flown!

We are launching our next decade well prepared, with a strong Board of Directors with well rounded professional skills. Our six Board appointed committees are strong and well organized with 56 volunteers who are talented and well respected in the community. These folks are ready to help propel us forward!

Asset development is the current top priority of the Foundation. We have established an Ambassadors program to train and recognize our volunteers who help spread the word in the community. We will be spending more time meeting with existing as well as prospective donors interested in the Foundation as well as meeting with Professional Advisers to better learn of their needs to assist in making more referrals to us.

Moreover, we are collaborating with Orillia, Barrie, and Bradford Community Foundations to increase awareness and understanding of community foundations in Simcoe County. Over the next 24 months, the four foundations will be developing new joint communication and marketing strategies in the areas they serve as well as using a new integrated management software program to improve external communications and build upon our databasae management. The HUB project as this collaborative is known, is a result of an Ontario Trillium Foundation grant, which should help significantly increase the profile and giving to Simcoe County's community foundations. Additionally, we will be exploring opportunities to extend our reach to Wasaga Beach and Collingwood.



Huronia Community Foundation will continue to build on our previous good work of linking over 40 family legacies (endowments) to their community. We are proud of the relationships we have built with our donors, our volunteers, of the thoughtfulness and consideration taken in the grant-making decisions and of the low costs of managing our funds and of the flexibility we provide to our donors.

Our Mission in Action

Gift of Grace Soup Kitchen

As 'Mary' saw the group of people approach her table with a cake brightly lit with candles, she could hear their voices rising in unison, singing the birthday song. Her heart swelled and she couldn't stop the tears from sliding down her cheeks. This is the first birthday cake for the 45-year-old woman, the first time she ever heard those words directed at her.

Life is getting better now that she has found a welcoming place to go on Tuesday mornings. The volunteers at the Gift of Grace Soup Kitchen in Midland and the 40 - 75 clients who come each week have become friends. Although the food she receives nourishes her body, the camaraderie feeds her soul.



The soup kitchen is operated on a small budget but makes a huge difference to the needy people of Midland. For some, the food served on Tuesdays is the only decent meal they have all week.

Lately they have seen an increase in the number of people who need help, while donations have decreased. Without a Huronia Community Foundation grant of \$1,000 in 2011, the charitable organization would have run out of money.

YMCA Camp Kitchikewana



Swimming, canoeing, bonfires and friends – any Camp Kitchikewana alumnus will tell you that this and more is all part of the experience at the popular camp on the shores of Georgian Bay. But for one special camper who was immersed in the 'Kitchi' culture, the experience was life changing.

Although 'John' may not be developing the same as his peers, he was just as involved in the Camp Kitchikewana customs as every other child: developing friendships, exploring Beausoleil Island, and most importantly to him, overcoming his vertigo to jump the 'crazy tower'. The result was a more confident, healthier and calmer individual returning home with memories he'll cherish forever.

John's 2010 summer adventure was made possible with a grant by the Huronia Community Foundation to the YMCA Strong Kids Campaign. The \$1,140 award covered a two-week overnight camping session, including food, accommodation, programs, travel costs and staff wages.

The goal of the Strong Kids Campaign is to raise enough money so they never have to turn a child away for financial reasons. Without the generosity of community partners like the Huronia Community foundation, this would not be possible.





Message from the Grants Chair - Helmut Paddags

The Grants Committee awards money to local charities based on the criteria established by the Foundation. We were fortunate to be able to contribute to the work of many deserving organizations. Unfortunately, there were insufficient funds to help all the worthy applicants. We allocate the proceeds from the Unrestricted Funds, Field of Interest Funds and the Flow-through Funds, three of the six types of funds available at Huronia Community Foundation. Please see page 12 for the definitions of all types of funds.

Spring 2011 Grants:

- The Huronia Museum: \$969 grant for its travelling education program and exhibit of war medals received by men and women of Huronia.
- Habitat for Humanity North Simcoe: \$1,500 grant to assist with moving a house to a site in Penetanguishene.
- YMCA of Simcoe Muskoka: \$1,140 grant to enable two campers to enjoy a week of overnight camping at YMCA Camp Kitchikewana through the Strong Kids Campaign.
- Catholic Family Services of Simcoe County: \$1,050 grant to provide Critical Incident Stress Management Training.
- Midland Community Gardens: \$1,250 grant to create garden plots in Little Lake Park for personal and community consumption as well as education about sustainable gardening.
- Shelter Now: \$1,250 grant to build a therapeutic garden and healing waterfall with pond.
- Gilda's Club Simcoe Muskoka: \$1,250 grant to operate two cancer support one-day summer camps.

- Junior Achievement of Central Ontario: \$1,000 grant to provide Economics for Success programs in Huronia to help students understand the economics of life.
- Midland Area Reading Council: \$1,100 grant to assist with running tutor training workshops.
- Gift of Grace Soup Kitchen Knox Presbyterian Church: \$1,000 grant to buy supplies to feed the hungry.
- Quest Art School and Gallery: \$900 grant to provide facilitators for the Brown Bag Series of educational programs.
- Canadian Diabetes Association: \$700 grant to install equipment for a low ropes course at Camp Huronda for diabetic children.
- Life Skills and Independence for Teens: \$500 grant to assist with food for youths to cook meals.
- Eat Well to Excel: \$500 grant to provide student nutrition programs in local schools.

Each recipient provides an evaluation of the success of their program and an impact report. A small sum of money is available to be allocated during the remainder of the year for youth oriented grants.

It has been a rewarding experience for me to work with such dedicated people on the Foundation Board, the Grants Committee and the media. We look forward to working with Barbara Jones who will assume the chair of the Grants Committee this year.

Fund Definitions

Community Unrestricted Endowment Funds This is a general Fund that gives the Foundation the greatest flexibility in awarding Grants to charities. This type of Fund is not tied into any specific charity or area of interest, allowing the Foundation to respond to the immediate and changing needs of the community.

Donor Advised Endowment Funds

This fund enables donors to have ongoing participation in the selection of charities that will benefit from their gift.

Designated Endowment Funds

This type of Fund gives the donor the opportunity to specify, at the time the Fund is established, which particular charity or charities they would like to support in perpetuity.

Field of Interest Endowment Funds

Donors identify an area of interest that they would like their donation to support. Examples include the arts, environment, health, seniors, children, youth, recreation, relief of poverty, or education.

Managed Funds

Managed Funds are held on behalf of a charity or charitable group with the annual returns periodically distributed back to the group.

Flow-Through Funds

The capital and income from these Funds are distributed over a one year period.



Making A Differnece Now and Forever

Funds Inspired by Penny & Dunc McLaren

The McLaren's are two selfless people who have had a profound impact on Huronia Community Foundation and the community at large.

Some time ago, Penny McLaren established the Len Self Youth Challenge in memory of her dad, the Reverend Len Self. "Dad taught us well," says Penny. "Life is measured by our good deeds. It is in the giving that we receive and the gifts we give today will leave positive footprints in our communities." In order to better manage the trust, the trustees of the Len Self Youth Challenge incorporated in the spring of 2000 to become the 99th 'community foundation' in Canada – the Huronia Community Foundation. The original fund, now called the Len Self Youth Endowment Fund, creates grants for youth in the community, a passion of the Reverend Len.

Huronia Community Foundation helps donors build funds to make the difference they want to make in the community – to give back in a way that has meaning to them. For instance, Dunc and Penny helped establish a second fund - the Bondar Nursing Endowment Fund. The aim is to provide financial assistance to students entering the nursing field. Grants have been made to students at the local schools.

Undaunted, Dunc McLaren set up "Ticker" (Christopher) Stow Endowment Fund in memory of his stepfather. "Ticker" was a long-time supporter of the local Alzheimer's Association, the Salvation Army, Red Cross, Penetanguishene Public Library and Severn Sound Environmental Association. With this fund, Dunc has assured that these organizations will continue to benefit from the late "Ticker's" annual donations. What a great way to remember and acknowledge a loved one!

The dynamic duo established a fourth Endowment Fund. The Duncan James McLaren Fund, a dual purpose fund, will use its earnings to help cover the foundation's administrative costs and to further its charitable purposes.



Dunc and Penny see the Foundation as the perfect vehicle for donors to keep both large and small donations coming back to the community. "We like how a fund can be tailored to suit you and how it can be managed for or by you. The foundation provides good returns for both building the principal and granting. You can be involved as much as you wish in determining the grants" notes Dunc.

The financial statements of Huronia Community Foundation were audited by the firm of Tony V. Hsiung, Chartered Accountant. The complete audited financial statements, with accompanying notes, are available from the Foundation on the Foundation's website. The figures for the above financial highlight are consistent with that of the audited financial statements

Endowment donations are held in perpetuity and the earnings are used to support the changing needs and opportunities of the community. Managed Fund contributions such as for the Medical Student Scholarship program are not held in perpetuity but are invested over time. Flow-Through contributions are distributed over a one-year period.

The Foundation administers flow through donations on behalf of Physician Recruitment, the Georgian Bay Cancer Support Centre, PAK (Players Assisting Kids) and Beausoleil First Nations "Step Up" Award.



The Benefits of Giving

Tax Benefits of Giving

Here are some scenarios to help you understand the tax benefits of giving to charity.

1) The potential tax savings for donations in excess of \$200 in any one year: with a donation of \$10,000 you will potentially receive federal & provincial credits of \$4,640 for a total tax savings of 46.4% (as a % of the gift.)

2) Rather than pay taxes on your RRSP and RRIF income, donate this income to charity for a tax benefit.

3) Donating publicly traded stocks, bonds, mutual funds or other securities is a tax-smart way to give. Electronically transfer your securities from your brokerage account to the charity brokerage account and receive a tax receipt for the full appreciated value - similar to when you donate cash gifts. As of May 2, 2006, you will not be subject to any capital gains tax, making donating securities the most tax-effective way to make your donation.

4) Don't make the CRA your prime beneficiary! Once you have considered the needs of your family and loved ones, consider including a charitable bequest in your Will to ensure that your final wishes are fulfilled and to help keep that taxman at bay. If your estate includes stock with capital gains, this tax will be triggered. You can reduce the estate taxes by donating some of the stock to charity through your Will. When you make a bequest to Huronia Community Foundation, your personal legacy of giving is created when we establish a special fund that benefits the community forever. A gift of insurance can work in much the same way. Donating an insurance policy to the charity can provide tax relief to the estate.

By carefully planning your bequest, you can reduce or eliminate the taxes payable on your estate. Your estate can claim gifts in the year of death equal to 100 per cent of your net income in that year and the preceding year. And, you will have the satisfaction of knowing that your bequest will be helping your community forever.
